### **State Initiatives**

- In June 2014, Act 71 was passed in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania as House Bill 1559. The law requires every school entity to 1) adopt suicide prevention policies and procedures; and 2) provide 4 hours of suicide prevention training to educators in grades 6-12 every 5 years. Schools must also integrate youth suicide prevention and awareness programming for students.
- The Garrett Lee Smith "Suicide Prevention in Pennsylvania Schools and Colleges Initiative" is a five-year grant awarded to the Pennsylvania Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (OMHSAS). The project targets youth ages 10-24 and provides awareness, training, and screening activities within schools, colleges, and behavioral health agencies throughout the commonwealth.
- For over 30 years, the Pennsylvania Network for Student Assistance Services (PNSAS) and school Student Assistance Programs (SAP) have partnered to address youth suicide prevention/intervention efforts in the commonwealth. Together, PNSAS, the Garrett Lee Smith Initiative, Act 71, and Prevent Suicide PA are working with school SAP teams to build a stronger safety net for our youth. This safety net includes early identification of observable risk behaviors, the SAP process for referrals, school and community supports/resources, and school/district youth suicide prevention policies and procedures.
